RAISE A GLASS

Domiciliary is first component of \$300 million Rebuild Illinois initiative

Jan. 28, 2025, won't soon be forgotten. Thirty-seven independent living residents were officially welcomed into the new state-of-the-art Quincy Domiciliary building and now call it home.

The building features 35 studio apartments and 45 1-bedroom suites providing private space in a communal setting. Each apartment boasts large windows providing plenty of natural sunlight and views of our beautiful campus. They are equipped with a kitchenette, private bathroom, furniture, refrigerator, microwave, wall-mounted television and ample closet space. The building has common spaces for gathering and activities, a fitness room and a new dining area with floor to ceiling windows opening onto a spacious outdoor deck. The building is 80,000 square feet and stands three and a half stories tall.

This building is the first component of the \$300 million Rebuild Illinois initiative, a federal and state partnership managed by Illinois Capital Development Board. This is CDB's largest project to date and



includes a 210-bed long-term care residential facility slated to open later this year, along with campus upgrades to infrastructure, utilities, and landscaping to support the new facilities. This project modernizes the campus and significantly improves the quality of care available to Illinois veterans.


IDVA held a press release on opening day. IDVA Director Terry Prince, Administrator Chuck Newton, Chief Engineer Dave Clifford and Director of Nursing Julia Togarepi welcomed members of the media and local dignitaries who toured the building. The move was coordinated by Golden Bridges with the support of staff, volunteers and local veteran service organizations. At the end of the day, all residents were comfortably settled into their new apartments.

Clifford said during the press conference, "Since 2021 when construction began, this has just been a building because it has been vacant. Today at 10:01 a.m., it became a home."



Thank you to the Volunteer Voices for bringing music and spreading cheer around campus.






BOOT CAMP



He served in the reserve component of the Army and Air Force for more than 20 years and is actively involved with American Legion Post 37, having served as the Honor Guard commander and service officer for several years. Roger's passion is the weapons that won the wars, and he has already secured donations to add various firearms to



many of the displays.

The theme of the All-Wars Museum is United States military history, with displays spanning all major conflicts in American history, from the Revolutionary War through Desert Storm. Stop in to visit with greeters and spend time looking at the many displays featuring uniforms, models of battleships and aircraft, flags, weapons, currency, a replica Revolutionary War cannon and

numerous medals and patches, including the Medal of Honor awarded to the late Cpl. Lester Hammond of Quincy.

The museum is open from March 1 through the Wednesday before Thanksgiving. Tuesday through Saturday hours are 9-noon and 1-4 p.m., Sunday 1-4 p.m. and closed on Mondays.

Home.


