Message from IDVA Director Terry Prince

With summer in full swing, it's hard to imagine that in just a few weeks, we will be seeing kids go back to school and welcome the long-awaited start of another NFL season. When I was in the military, this was always a big season for moving. Every three or four years, most of us would get a set of permanent change of station (PCS) orders which meant a new opportunity. As you're reading this, there are incredible opportunities to join the crew of IDVA, along with a number of other jobs with the State of Illinois.

In our five Veterans' Homes in Anna, Chicago, LaSalle, Manteno, and Quincy, we care for nearly 1,000 veterans 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We need nurses, certified nurse assistants, dietitians, activities professionals, physical therapists, housekeepers, and engineers, to name a few of the roles.

We employ Veteran Service Officers (VSOs) across the state to assist veterans in obtaining their earned benefits and services. The training is comprehensive and equips VSOs with the knowledge and tools to guide veterans. It's rewarding to assist a veteran in obtaining life-changing benefits, which may impact an entire family.

The State Approving Agency team works one-on-one with veterans in accessing earned federal educational benefits. Thousands of DD214s are provided to veterans through our records department. In our Central Office, we hire the highest level of professionals to support these teams so they can perform their jobs effectively and efficiently.

I am impressed by IDVA's recruiters and human resources teams that creatively reach the community to showcase our open roles and to positions interested candidates with knowledge of how to seek, apply for, and obtain jobs at IDVA. Later in this issue, you will see in-person and virtual career fairs that offer job counseling, resume writing, and guidance on how the state of Illinois hires. Hire a Veteran

Veterans in Illinois Spotlight Workforce Value, Expanding Paths to Employment

Illinois employers marked Hire a Veteran Day this July by promoting the value veterans bring to the state's workforce and by highlighting tools available to support veteran hiring.

Observed annually on July 25, Hire a Veteran Day highlighted how veterans strengthened Illinois businesses through leadership, discipline, and adaptability gained during military service. Those traits supported high performance in civilian roles and helped employers meet staffing needs in competitive and high-demand industries.

Employers that hire veterans benefit from a talent pool with proven work ethic and job readiness, which reduces risk and cost at the start of recruitment. Veterans often bring specialized training that supports efficient operations and improved service delivery. Veterans apply their experience in logistics, technology, health care, or engineering to help employers meet specific operational and staffing needs.

Across Illinois, employers also reported workplace gains beyond technical expertise. Veterans are known for teamwork, accountability, and a focus on mission completion, which supports positive workplace culture and consistent productivity. Their tendency toward reliability and long-term commitment helps stabilize staff levels and reduce turnover.

Illinois employers have access to Illinois JobLink accounts as a resource to search for veteran candidates. Veterans also receive priority for job openings and other employment-related benefits through Illinois JobLink. In addition, IDVA has several resources available to veterans seeking jobs, such as Helmets to Hardhats.

Excerpts from press release issued on July 15, 2026

Governor Pritzker Signs Legislation Strengthening Support for Service Members and Veterans

Governor JB Pritzker signed three bills into law that will fortify recruitment to the Illinois National Guard with newly incentivized peer-to-peer referral practices, as well as connect our state's veterans to continued education pathways and life-saving breakthrough therapies for suicide prevention.

The bills include:

SB 3737: Requires universities to promptly readmit students following academic military medical leave, effective January 2027.

SB 3818: Incentivizes Illinois National Guard recruitment with peer-to-peer referrals, effective January 1, 2027.

SB 3926: Moves the Breakthrough Therapies for Veteran Suicide Prevention Program Advisory Council under the Department of Public Health, effective January 1, 2027.

Supporting Access to Breakthrough Therapies for Veterans' Mental Health

The Breakthrough Therapies for Veteran Suicide Prevention Program Advisory Council was created to advise the State on the health care infrastructure needed to provide veterans with access to preliminary clinical drug trials that might offer significant mental health benefits. These therapies include MDMA and pharmaceutical-grade psilocybin, which are used to treat post-traumatic stress disorder, treatment-resistant depression and anxiety – conditions many veterans struggle with after service and combat.

SB 3926 amends the Department of Healthcare and Family Services Law and the Department of Public Health Act, moving the Council under the purview of the Illinois Department of Public Health, which is better equipped to oversee and support this specific program.

"Veterans are at a 58 percent higher risk of dying by suicide, and as advocates for veterans, we witness the challenges each day," said Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs Director Terry Prince. "SB 3926 exemplifies the state's commitment to implementing every strategy available to ensure Illinois veterans receive the resources, therapies, and support they need to avoid a crisis and prevent suicide."

Veterans' Homes

Providing residents of Illinois' five Veterans' Homes with activities and events is central to IDVA's mission to care for the whole person. The activities teams carefully plan theme-based parties which include special menus and entertainment. Flag Day and the Nation's 250th Birthday were recently celebrated and enjoyed.

Lourdes Hurtado Fernando, Army

Lourdes Hurtado Fernando is a Chicago-based realtor and an 11-year Army National Guard veteran who has dedicated her career to helping veterans build financial stability through homeownership. After using her own VA loan to purchase a multi-unit property and create passive income during a difficult period in her life, Lourdes made it her mission to ensure other veterans understood the full power of their benefits. Today, over 90% of her real estate business is VA-focused, and she is widely recognized for her expertise in guiding veterans through buying, investing, and using real estate as a tool for long-term wealth.

In 2022, Lourdes co-founded VA Housing Education, a program designed to teach veterans how to strategically leverage their VA home loan. She is deeply embedded in the veteran community, volunteering with Chicago Veterans, Merging Vets & Players, and the Travis Manion Foundation. She also created and leads the All-Women Veterans Program with Chicago Veterans and founded Healing Barracks / Operation Wholeness, a 12-week bootcamp-style transitional program focused on healing, structure, and empowerment for women veterans.

Lourdes serves on the Keller Williams Agent Leadership Council, where she has chaired the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee for the past three years, and serves on the International Agent Leadership Council. She is the Keller Williams Midwest Military Representative, supporting agents and military families across the region.

Lourdes' work continues to prove that real estate is more than a career, it is a vehicle for empowerment, education, and transformation in the veteran community.

Dr. Glenisha Foreman, PhD, CCMHC, LCPC, CAMS-II, CCISM, EMDR is a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor (LCPC), Marine Corps Veteran, Founder and Clinical director of Verdure Counseling, a counseling organization focused on bringing growth and wellness to the clients they serve. After completing active-duty military service, she obtained a Master of Arts in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from Concordia University and a Doctorate in Counseling Education and Supervision from Governors State University. Serving in the military enabled her to travel to various places around the world providing her with rich multicultural experiences forming the foundation of her culturally affirming practices. Dr. Foreman is a board certified Clinical Mental Health Counselor, specializing in Trauma, with experience working with both mental health and substance abuse issues. She is also a nationally certified anger management provider, internationally certified in Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) therapy and certified in Critical Incident Stress Management.

Dr. Foreman has facilitated the spread of knowledge, mental health, and advocacy through teaching at Northeastern Illinois University and conducting various presentations on trauma, stress management, working with veterans, Navigating the VA. She is passionate about helping those in need, and with the assistance from her team at Verdure Counseling, Dr. Foreman often hosts and participates in events that provide essential services to veterans and families in need within the community.

Hello Girls

On July 16th, at the Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery, Renee Messelin, one of the first group of the U.S. Army Signals Corps Telephone Operators, was honored with the installation of her cenotaph ("In Memory Of") marker. Renee, a Chicago native, was a supervisor of the "The Hello Girls," who served in France during World War I. WI. During the war, 223 Hello Girls, who spoke English and French, connected over 26 million battlefields, supply, and diplomatic calls in 20 months. Most were immigrants or first-generation Americans. They were an international force of American women soldiers. After the war, they were denied veteran status for 60 years until 1977. In December 2024, the Hello Girls received the Congressional Gold Medal, the nation's highest civilian award. The design is currently under review at the U.S. Mint.

Assistant Director Anthony Vaughn participated in the ceremony, which included a speaking program, wreath laying, taps, and a rifle salute. Nearly 30 of the Hello Girls with ties to Illinois, some have found their final resting places in cemeteries across the state.



Renee Messelin Biography

Chief Operator Renee Messelin was born in Chicago, Illinois, on September 12, 1890. She was the daughter of Mack and Mamie (Park) Caldwell, a prominent African American couple. Their third child, Ellarane Yvonne Caldwell (her birth name), grew up in Chicago and attended Hyde Park High School. She graduated in 1909 and began work as a teacher.

Ellarane had a brief marriage to Mr. Arthur Brehm in Ohio, although she was soon back in Chicago. She then married Maurice Messelin in 1913 at Grace Presbyterian Church. Since Maurice was a French citizen, she lost her American citizenship under the 1907 Expatriation Act. About this time, Ellarene took the name "Renee" and likely began passing as white. The couple lived in Spokane for a short time, near his mother, brother and sister-in-law. By 1916, they were in California, and their marriage ended in divorce.

When she applied to join the Army, Ms. Messelin was living in San Francisco. She claimed French birth, likely knowing that had she admitted that she was African American, she would not have been allowed to join the unit.

Ms. Messelin was assigned as a supervisor, being a proficient operator and an accomplished linguist. Assigned initially to Paris, Ms. Messelin was later promoted to Chief Operator and transferred to Brest, where she likely helped to organize the redeployment of troops after the Armistice. She returned to the States in September 1919. She then married Sergeant Major Edward Van Gundy, a fellow soldier. This marriage returned her American citizenship. The couple moved to Denver, Colorado, although this third marriage also ended in divorce.

Her fourth and final marriage was to Mr. Robert S. Arthur in 1927. Mrs. Arthur took to the stage, starring in several movies and radio plays as "Renee Rodier." When the couple moved to Florida, Renee retired from acting. They stayed together until Robert died in 1969.

Ellarene Yvonne Caldwell Brehm Messelin Van Gundy Arthur, also known as Renee Rodier, passed away in Florida in the summer of 1977. The myth of her French birth followed her to the grave, and her true heritage was discovered in 2024.

By claiming a French heritage, she was able to serve in the US Army and to perform on stage. This new life likely exacted a price. She may have never seen her birth family again. Renee took control of her story and of her life, in a time when African American women had few options. She is the first documented African American woman to serve overseas in the U. S. Army.
